
Stirling Castle and The Falkirk Wheel



Stirling Castle is one of the largest and most important castles, both historically and architecturally, in Scotland. Several Scottish Kings and Queens have been crowned at Stirling, including Mary, Queen of Scots, in 1543.



The Falkirk Wheel is a rotating boat lift. It connects the Forth and Clyde Canal with the Union Canal. The wheel is the only rotating boat lift of its kind in the world, and is regarded as a Scottish engineering landmark.

Four Lochs and Inverary Castle **Inverary Castle** was built in 1789 for the 5th Duke of Argyll on the site of the then village. The **LOCH LONG** village was rebuilt on the Loch side, out of view of the castle. Founded in 1451, **Glasgow University** is the fourth-oldest in the English-speaking world. Previous students have included scientist Lord Kelvin, economist Adam Smith, and the pioneer of television John Logie Baird.



The first stone built **Glasgow Cathedral** was dedicated in the presence of King David I in 1136. The present building was consecrated in 1197. The Cathedral has one of the finest post-war collections of stained glass windows to be found in Britain.



George Square in the City Centre is used for a variety of events, ranging from promotional campaigns to arts fairs as well as concerts and displays.



Glasgow's Oldest House **Provand's Lordship** was built in 1471. It was originally part of a hospital. It is one of only four medieval buildings to survive in Glasgow.



Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum is one of Scotland's most popular free attractions. 22 themed, state-of-the-art galleries displaying an astonishing 8000 objects including natural history, arms and armour, art from many art movements and periods of history, and much more.

In the heart of Pollok Country Park, **The Burrell** is an awardwinning building which houses a unique collection of work by major artists including Rodin, Degas and Cézanne, to late medieval art, Chinese and Islamic art, Ancient Civilizations and more.

Glasgow Museum of Modern Art plays an important part in the city's rich heritage. For over 100 years the building was a centre for business, commercial exchange and trading of goods. GMMA collects and borrows work that highlights the interests, influences and working methods of artists from around the world to share with those from Glasgow.
